(6.5) Literature

I CAN analyze how a sentence, chapter, scene, or stanza fits into the structure of a text and contributes to the development of the theme/setting/plot.

(6.5) Informational

I CAN analyze how a particular sentence, paragraph, chapter, or section fits into the structure of a text and contributes to the development of the ideas.

(6.6) Literature

I CAN explain how an author develops the point of view of the narrator or speaker in a text.

(6.6) Informational

I CAN analyze multiple accounts of the same event/topic, noting important similarities/differences in the point of view they represent.

(6.4) Literature

I CAN determine the meaning of words and phrases as they are used in a text, including figurative and connotative meanings.

(6.4) Informational

I <u>CAN</u> determine the meaning of words and phrases used in a text, including figurative, connotative, and technical meanings.

(6.4) Literature

I <u>CAN</u> examine and <u>explain</u> the author's choice of specific <u>words</u> and the <u>impact</u> on the <u>tone/meaning</u> of the text.

(6.6) Informational

I <u>CAN</u> determine an author's **point of view** or purpose in a text and explain how it is conveyed in the text.

(6.7) Literature

I <u>CAN</u> compare/contrast the experience of reading a story/drama/poem by listening or viewing an audio/video/live version, including contrasting what I "see" and "hear" when reading the text to what I perceive when I listen or watch.

(6.7) Informational

I <u>CAN</u> integrate information presented in different media or formats, as well as in words to develop a coherent understanding of a topic or issue.

(6.6) Writing

I <u>CAN</u> use technology, including the Internet, to produce and publish writing as well as to interact and collaborate with others; demonstrate sufficient command of keyboarding skills to type a minimum of three pages in a single sitting.
